NOBILITAS Patriæ DECVS

HE Lord our God (right honorable) having, by the power of his word, created Heauen & Farth: with all thinges what soeuer, for the benistite comfort & vie of Manithe lest of all other (even the fixt daye) he made man after his owne similatude and likenesse, that in him he

might be glorified aboue all other Creatures. And therfore, whereas in making of other thinges, he vsed onely this worde Fiant, be thei made, or let them be made: when he came to make Man, consulting with himself, &c as it were asking councell at his Wisedome, he said Faciany shownsh, let vs make Man, that is a woderfull Creature: and therfore is called in greek [MRQOTACS a litle world in himself. And truely he is no lesse, whether we consider his spiritual soule, or his humaine body. For what Creature is ther ypon the face of the Earth comparable to man, either in body or in minde? What creature hath a soule immortall inherent in his body, but only Mā? what Creature can forese things to come, reméber things past, or iudge of things present, but one

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ly man; what Creature beareth the image of God about with him, but man? what Creature is made so erect to behold the Heattens, as man? What Creatute may bee likened to man whether we respect the lineaments the demensions and proportion of the body, or the gifts & graces of the mind. And (finally) what Creature hath the promise of the refunectio & glorificatio of their bodies,& of eternall life but onely man ? Than feeying the Lorde hath made man thus glorious, and preferred him by euery degree aboue all other Creatures (the Angeli-call Creatures fet apart) it is manifest he hath done it to fome end & purpose, namely, that he might be glorified in him, and by him about all other his works, according to the measure of his integritie excellencie and perfection. And hereby we may learne that it is the wil of GOD, that we should bend all our force to the aduauncing of his glorie, the edification of his people, & the building vp of his Churche, whiche he hath redemed with the bloud of his deare conne.

To the erection wherof, enery one conferred fome what, fome brought gold, some filuer, and some braffe, lead & tin:other brought filk purple, fkarlet, and other ornaments, and the meanest brought some what, namely, Ikins, heare, fand, lime, morter, wood, stone, & fuch like. Euen fo(right honorable) would the Lorde haue enery one to conferre fomewhat, even fuch as he hath, to the building of his spiritual house, the Church, purchased with the bloud of Christ . Wherefore seeing it is so, that enery one is to further this spirituall building to his possible power: I have rather chosen with the simplest, & meanest fort to bring, though but heir, fand, Tkins, lime, morter, wood, and stones, than altogether to contribute nothing.

Not doubting, but that the chief Mailter and Builder of this house, Christ Jesus, wil not dislike, but accept of this my poore contribution, no lesse then he did of the

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poore wydowes Mite, to whom it was imputed that the had cast more, in Gazophilatium Templi, into the treafury of the Temple, then al the rest: for what she wanted in effect, that the supplied in affect. And for that also the Lord our GOD committing his telents to every one, whether more or leffe, not only requireth of vs the fame againe simply, but also, as a straight computift, demaus deth interest & gaine of every one of vs:& for that not onely, he is a murtherer & a Homicide before God, who fluieth or killeth, a man with materiall fword, but he alfo, who may preuent the same, & will not And for that not onely, he is guiltie of hainous transgression that comitteth any euill really, but also he who consenteth to it, as he doth, who holdeth his peace, or he who by any means night avoid it, & either for negligence willnot, or for feare of the world dare not. Therfore, albeit, that I have received, but one poore talent, or rather but the thadowe of one, yet least I might be reproved (with that unprofitable fertiatint) for hyding my final talant in the Earth not profiting therewith at all, either my felf, or others, I have adurtured the making of this litle treatife, intituled, (The Anatomy of Abuses,) hoping that the fame (by divine affiftance) shal somewhat coduce to the building vp,& erectio of this spiritual house of the lord. And although I be one (most honorable Lord that can do least in this godly course of life(palpable barbarifme forbidding me fo much as once to enter into wifdoms schoole yet for that some will not, for feare of lofing worldly promotion (though in the meane time thel lose the Kingdome of Heauen,) othersome dare not for displeasing the world: I say, for these, & semblable causes together, with the zeale & goodwil I beare vnto

my Countrey, and feruent delire of their convertion & amendment, I have taken vpon me the cottining of this booke: Which God graunt may be with like plaufible alacritie received, as with paines & goodwill, I have published it, for the benisit of my Courrey, the pleasure of the godly, and amendment of the wicked. And I doubt not, that as none, but the wicked, and pernerfe whose gawld backes are tutched, will repine against me, so the Godly and vertuous, will accept of this my labour, and trauaile herein fustained, whose gentle fauour & good.

After that I had (right honorable fully perfected this booke, I was minded, notwithstanding, bothe in regard of the straingenes of the matter it intreateth of, and alforn respect of the indenesse of my penne, to have suppressed it for ever, for diverse and sundrie causes, and never to have officed it to the viewe of the World. But notwithstanding, being overcome by the importunate tequest, and insatigable delive of my steinds, I graunted to publish the same, as now you see, is extant.

But, when I had once grafited to imprinte the fame, I was ingreater doubt than the before, fearing, to whome I might dedicat the fame to rude & impolished aworke. And withall I was not ignorant, how hard a thing it is in thefe daies to finde a Patrone of fuch books as this, which thewith to every one his fin, & discouereth euery Mans wicked waies, which indeed, the vingodly can not at any had abide, but as it were mad men difgorging their flomacks Cum in Authoré tum in codicem plenis buccis, & dentibus plusquam caninis rabide feruntur:)they rage, thei fume and raile both a. gamil the Arruga and his booke. Thus (vacillante animo)my mind wilding too & fro, & refting, as it weare in extalie of despaire, at last I called to mind your honorable Lordhip, whose praises have pearced the Skies,& whose saudable vertues ar blowen, not ouer the realme of England onely, but even to the furthest costs & parts of the world.

All whose vertues, and condigne praises, if I should take upon snee to recount, I might as well number the states in the Sky, or graffe upon the Earth.

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tions with my valearned penne, (litle, or nothing at all, emphaticall) I will rather furcease, than further to proceed hearein, cotenting my self rather to have given a shadowe of them, then to have ciphered them foorth, which indeed are both infinit, and inexplicable.

In confideration (whereof) not withflanding that my Booke be fimpler, bafer, and meaner, than that it may (without bluthing) prefent it felf to your good Lordship (being far vinworthie of such an honorable Personage) yet according to your accustomed clemencie, I most humbly beleeche your good Lordship to receive the same into your honors Patrociny and prorection, accepting it as an infallible token of my faithfull heavie, fermice, and good will towardes your honorable Lordshipt For proofe whereof, would GOD it might once come to passe, that is not otherwise, yet with my humble fermice, I might shewe foorth the faithfull & euer willing heart I heare in brest to your good Lordeship, protesting before Heauen and Earth, that though power want, yet shall fiddlitie, and faithfulnes saile neuer.

And because, this my Booke is subject (my very good Lord) to as many reproches, tauntes and reproofes, as euer was any little booke subject vnto (for that sewe can aby de to heare their fins detected) therefore I have had the greater care to commit the same to the guardance & defence of your honour, rather the to many others, not onely for that GOD hath made your honour a Lamp of light vnto the world, a mirrour of true nobilitie and a rare Phenix of integritie and perfection, but also hath made you his substitute, or vicegerent, to reforme vices, punish abuses, and correcte sinne.

But the Lord our God forefame, that if he had clothed man, in rich and gorgious active (fuch is our proclinitie to finne) he would have bene proude thereof, as wee fee it is come to valle at this day (God amend it) and thereby purchase to himselfe, his bovie and foule, eternall bammation.

And if those that goe richly clothed hould be efteemed the rather for their riche apparell, then à contrario must those that goe in meane, and base attire, bee the more contemned, and velviled for their youertie And then should Chist Telus our great Ambassadour from the King of heaven, be contemned: for he came in poore and meane arap: but Chilt Jelus is bleffed in his poore ragges, and all others are contemued in their riche and mecious attire. But let them be fure, as he that gathered flickes spon the Sabbaoth, was floued for his contempt of the fame, fo thall they be fromed, year grinded to peeces for their contempt of the Lora in his Sabbaoth.

The Iewes, are very first in keeping their Sabbaothes, in fo muche, as they will not welle the Sabaoth, their meates and brinkes byon the fame day, but fet it on the Tables the day before. They go not about two mptes opposithe Sabbaoth day, they fuffer not the bodic of any Fctone or Matefactor to hang upon the Gallowes upon the Sabbanth date, with legious of fuch like Superflitions. And which is most straunge, if any of them fall into any daunger, they will not fuffer any to labour for their delinerie upon that day, for violating their Sabbaoth. So it chaunced that a certaine lewe being in Englat, by greate calualtie fell into a Drivie bupon one of their Sabbaoth daics, and the people endenouring to helpe him forthe, be forbade them to labour about hym upon the Sabbaoth day, chooling rather to ope in that filthie flinking place, (as by the other morning he was bead in deede) then to breake, or violate the Lords Sabaoth. Wherein, as I do acknow. leage thei are but too ferupulous, and overshoote the marke, so we are therein plaine contempte. ous, and negligent, thooting thorte of the marke altogether.
